<p>1602 James I 24 Mar 1603 - 27 Mar 1625</p>	<p>Richard Hammond of Ellingham was lord of Ellingham Manor. The rector returned 106 communicants Plague at Beccles.</p> 	
<p>1603</p>	<p>Two of the co-heirs of Ralph Shelton passed the manor of Broome, the fulling mill at Ditchingham and lands and tenements in Ellingham to the third heir, William and Mary Cooke, who probably built the splendid Broome Hall (demolished in about 1825).</p> <p>Royal grant, in consideration of good services, was to Thomas, Lord Howard of Walden and Henry Howard, brother of Thomas, late Duke of Norfolk, and son of Henry, late Earl of Surrey of vast estates which included the advowsons of Ellingham and Windell.</p>	<p>Richard Davison, presented by John Copledyke.</p> 
<p>1604</p>	<p>The 1559 'rules' for the conduct of church services were more rigorously applied, the more puritan parishioners began to resist.</p>	
<p>1605</p>	<p>The Gunpowder Plot stirred up more attacks on Catholics.</p>	
<p>1607</p>	<p>A great flood breached behind Great Yarmouth and probably the Waveney Valley. The manor of Stockton soke was granted to Charles, duke of York, the King's son.</p>	
<p>1609</p>	<p>Licence to alienate the manor of Bungay Priors, and lands, etc. in Broome, Ellingham, Ditchingham, Ilketshall and Weston.</p>	
<p>1611</p>	<p>James Johnson, rector, presented by Richard Wright (the former rector?) and in the same year by the Earl of Norfolk.</p>
