1645	Creation of the New Model Army.	
1646	Onesimus Johnson (aged 18), son of James senior, clerk, apprenticed to Nicholas Lulmas, Norwich, worstead weaver for seven years. Onesimus died and was buried in Ellingham in 1679.	Thomas Potts rector died and left 5 acres for the poor of Kirby Cane. The humble Petition of Richard Catelyn, late a Member of this House, be referred to the Examination of the Committee of Lords and Commons for Sequestrations; to proceed therein according to Justice, notwithstanding any Order of this House for the Sequestering of his Estate.
1647	Witch-finder, Matthew Hopkins was busy locally. Mr John Hamond donated a bell inscribed "Tvba ad Ivdicivm Campana ad Ecclesiam" The bell sounded to the judgment of the Church.	John Watson, rector, presented by Richard Catelyn on condition that he took the Covenant. He was ejected during the Civil War.
1648	That this House doth accept of the Sum of One thousand Pounds, for a Fine, for the Delinquency of John Hamond, of Ellingham in the County of Norfolk, Gentleman: His Offence, That he was in Arms against the Parliament: He rendered upon the Articles of Truro: His Estate in Fee, in Possession, Five hundred and Twelve Pounds Three Shillings and Sixpence: Out of which issues for ever, per Annum, Six Pounds Nine Shillings and Ninepence; for One Life, per Annum, Ten Pounds: Which, being allowed, leaves the Fine, at a Tenth, One thousand Pounds. An Ordinance for granting a Pardon unto John Hamond, of Ellingham in the County of Norfolk, Gentleman, for his Delinquency, and for taking off the Sequestration of his Estate, was this Day read; and, upon the Question, passed; and ordered to be sent to the Lords for their Concurrence.	 <p>Neville Catelyn From a portrait of 1688 in Norwich Castle by an unknown artist.</p>
