## Kirby Cane

1680	Thomas Browne, Norwich's most learned man in scientific matters, noted that there were occasionally salmon in the Waveney.	
1681		Elizabeth Catelyn interred in the monument.
1683	<p>Grant by Robert, Earl of Salisbury, to Henry, Earl of Northampton conveying for £1800: Prior's Manor of Bungay, in Suffolk and Norfolk, demesne lands in towns and fields of Broome, Ellingham, Ditchingham and elsewhere.</p> <p>Miles Baspole listed as a juror for Ellingham Nevilles Manor.</p>	 <p>Garden house built.</p>
<i>James II</i> 6 Feb. 1685 – 11 Dec. 1688	<b>1688</b> John Harbord leased to John Botswaine, hoopmaker (wooden hoops which held together barrels for dry goods), an area of woodland (Westwood or Kingswood) belonging to the Crown, in Ellingham and Kirby Cane, part of the manor of Stockton Socon which specified the types of reserved timber.	
1689	Ellingham-Nevilles sold to Miles Baspole of Aylsham, by John Hamond.	
1690	Dispute between Sir Nevill Catelyn, plaintiff v Edmund Bunfellowe, defendant, concerning whether Ellingham Meadowe was town land belonging to the parish of Ellingham.	John Hardware, clerk died. William Rendall rector presented by Sir Nevill Catelyn.
1691	Bells rung to celebrate the victory at the Battle of the Boyne.	
<i>William III</i> 28 Dec. 1694- 8 March 1702		
1697	Sir William Hicks bart of Rockholt, Essex (1699 lunacy?) bought Nevilles Manor from Myles Baisepoole and others, property in Ellingham, Kirby Cane, Mettingham, etc.	
1698		Mrs Ann Rant of Yelverton died aged 66 years. She owned an estate of 21 acres, rood and 35 perches called Leechmere, lying in Kirby Cane, the rent of which supported her charitable foundations in Yelverton and Alpington.
1699		William Rendall, rector died.
