## Kirby Cane

1819	On Easter day, the rector, Roger Hall and his wife Jenny presented the church with a basin made in 1714.	John Sell Cotman made a pencil and wash drawing of Kirby Cane Hall and the church doorway in 1818. Ash and Elm timber trees, standing upon the Farm in the occupation of John Miller offered for sale.
<i>George IV</i> 29 January 1820 — 26 June 1830	Rectory (built in 1822) 	1820 Innkeeper Thomas Hewitt sold of all his effects to pay his debts. John Westlick, (probably a misspelling of Witlock 1794-1849) balloted for Militia service failed to turn up. <i>'That every Militia Man, who shall not appear at the time and place appointed for his being exercised, shall be deemed a Deserter, and if not taken until after the time of any such Exercise, shall forfeit and pay the sum 20£ and in default thereof shall be committed to the Common Gaol for the space six months. Any if any person shall harbour, conceal, assist any Deserter, knowing him to be such, the person so offending shall forfeit the sum Five Pounds. Whoever shall apprehend the above Deserters, will be entitled a Reward of Twenty Shillings fur each man apprehended.'</i>
1822	John Packard left 20s for the poor of Ellingham, which was usually distributed in bread.	Joseph Bradnum (a Non-Conformist of the Independent Church at Beccles) moved from Geldeston with his new bride, Dinah to take up up market gardening in the Row. By 1841 they had 11 children.
1825	Roger Hall, Rector died.	
1827	Constable John Watson was paid 5 shillings for making a militia list. James Betts, rector.	
1828	Navigation owned by S. Bryant.	Conveyance from the trustees of John Crisp Webster, Esq., to Robert Wilson, Esq., of lands in Kirby Cane.
<i>William IV</i> 26 June 1830 - 20 June 1837	1831 Population 333. Beccles Navigation Bill: entitled, <i>"An Act for making the River Waveney navigable for Ships and other Sea-borne Vessels from Rose-hall Fleet to the Mouth of Oulton Dyke; and for making and maintaining a Navigable Cut from the said River at Carlton Shares Mill into the said Dyke, leading to Oulton Broad, in the County of Suffolk."</i>	1830 Thomas Williams, farmer, died. 1831 Population 245 Joseph Bradnum (Senior) was gaoled for debt.
