1867		The smack Crescent, of Yarmouth, was lost in a gale on the 16th January. Her crew of six hands included George Hill of Kirby Cane.
1868	Interior of church thoroughly repaired. William Youngman took over the mill. Plans were drawn up for a new bridge.	Susan Goddard (61) died. whom the rector notes had served the school for 25 years.
1869	White Horse Public House 	Kirby Hall Estate (1,170 acres) was put up for sale. The sale catalogue suggests that at this time the estate comprised nearly the whole of the parish. The estate was still part of the Manor of Stockton with Soke. The Lord of the Manor, John Kerrich of Geldeston Hall, made an agreement with Lord Berners to redescribe the units of land listed in the Court Books for the Manor in the time of Phillippa Leman in terms of those described in the Tithe Commutation Map.  The sale catalogue also points out the newly built school and "the enlightened and liberal supervision" apparent upon the whole estate of Kirby Cane Hall. It was sold to Col Godfrey Greene, who had been the tenant there since at least 1857, now retired.
1870	The Elementary Education Act 1870, commonly known as Forster's Education Act, provided for compulsory schooling of all children between the ages of 5 and 12.	
1871	Population 380 Susan Hurn, (41), Sarah Porter (65) teachers Ellingham still had several shops.	Colonel Greene and his wife, Harriet, lived in the Hall with their daughter Ellen and her husband, retired Major-General Alfred Thomas Wilde, who had served in India lived with his daughter and grandchildren where two of their children had been born, but they had a new son, born in the Hall. They kept eleven house servants.  Cornelius Bradnum was in Portland Prison.  14 year old John Hill prosecuted by the RSPCA for flaying a live cat was sentence to 2 months hard labour.
1876	A new bell for St Mary's by Warner.	1875 William Badnum died at Campbell Town, Tasmania. 1875 Miss Mahala Claxton, schoolmistress of the National School aged 38.
