1878	<p>Miss Anne Elizabeth Cotton (Schoolmistress) of 35 pupils at the National School at a salary of £1 per week, free house (where she lived with her retired teacher father, Daniel who helped her) and coals.</p>	<p>Ellingham and Kirby Cane Town Lands sold at auction (with the consent of the Charity Commission) comprising 42a –0r-18p in 6 lots.</p>
1879	<p>Francis Charles Hughes-Hallett MP (1838-1903) conned Henry Smith into providing a venue for his adultery with his step-daughter (and Smith's niece) Beatrice Eugénie Selwyn (1865–1898), daughter of Lord Justice. The affair was of long duration. Hughes-Hallett had borrowed £5000 from her. The scandal forced him to flee to Dinard.</p> <p>Abatement of Tithe — The Rev. R. Cartwright has, unsolicited, returned the tithe payers of the parish of Ellingham, near Bungay. 11 per cent, reduction.</p>	
1882	<p>Trout put into the Waveney at Ellingham.</p> <p>The Rev. William Day French, clerk, M.A., was instituted to the rectory and parish church on the presentation of Emily French, of Ilketshall St John, Suffolk, widow.</p>	<p>When Amy Rackham died aged 33 (after childbirth?) her husband George, a labourer, employed his 16 year old sister to look after his 4 elder sons (8-13), and put another (1) and 2 daughters, 6 & infant in the Workhouse.</p> <p>Scarlet fever & Measles among the children.</p>
1884		<p>Temperance meeting in Old schoolroom led by Rev Upcher.</p>
1887		<p>School closed 3 weeks due to measles. Children's Frolick at the Rectory in September. School only closed for Christmas Day because of the time lost through illness during the year.</p>
