Representatives of all the organisations in which the Colonel had taken an active part attended, and two choir boy pupils were allowed to attend with the Headteacher. The whole school had two days holiday for the King's Silver Jubilee with sports, games and festive tea at Hall Farm.</p>

Ellingham Grist Mill now driven entirely by electricity.</p>	<p>Easter 1936: at Kirby Cane School, Mrs. B. B. Atkins, head teacher since July 2nd, 1923, received gifts to mark retirement. She left the village to return to her native city of Bristol. Mrs M. Watnes became schoolmistress. Kirby Cane school won the Norfolk County Shield in the Bird and Tree Annual essay, mainly it seems because of "a genuine and unmistakable keenness and originality which is extremely attractive".</p>
