Ellingham's first football club formed and won the Loddon Patterson Cup, and later the Bungay Charity Cup.  1963 Melvyn Riches became the milk delivery man for Dairy Farm, which he relinquished in 2015.</p>	<p>Bullards closed the Swan public house.</p> 
1964	<p>Ellingham Mill put up for sale as warehousing, but was still unsold in 1966, when Vitovis had it subdivided into six lots, with a covenant that it should never henceforth be used for milling.  First colour televisions.</p>	
1965	<p>Railway closed to passengers between Beccles and Bungay. School had its first television set and revolving surface blackboard.  To increase tourism there were vague proposals to re-open the Waveney between Geldeston and Bungay which was estimated to cost around £43,000 including dredging, tree clearance and repair of the three locks on that stretch of the river</p>	
1966	<p>Raymond (Bill) John Crisp died and was succeeded by his son Major Simon Crisp. PC Cunningham gave lessons leading up to the National Cycling Proficiency Certificate.</p>
